$1. \quad \textbf{2. LEARNING OUTCOMES}$

The course aims to familiarize students with the problem of mimesis and its historical evolution in the Philosophy of Art from Antiquity up to the 19th century. At the termination of the course students should be able to:

Develop critical thinking upon the notion of mimesis (analytical thinking).

Understand the skills activated by artistic creativity and the latter's relationship with knowledge.

1. 3. COURSE CONTENT

The course will examine the historical evolution of the notion of mimesis in Aesthetics and the Philosophy of Art from Antiquity up to the 19th century. It will focus on the most important moments of this evolution (Classical Antiquity, Renaissance, Enlightenment) in order to show that, despite the fact that the notion of mimesis seems to constitute an unchanged principle in Western art for over twenty centuries, it nevertheless presents a number of internal tensions, fluctuations and transformations which have to be underlined and comparatively analyzed. This analysis will enable us to better understand the relationship between art, nature, knowledge and imagination, through extensive references to texts by various philosophers and theoreticians.
